Nine young adventurers, kitted up in wet weather gear and gumboots, trekked through The Groynes in heavy rain for their first experience of orienteering.

Aged nine weeks to four years, the Avonhead Play Centre troupe accompanied by their mums helped read the map, listened to the clues and searched high and low for the markers on their first Wild Wednesday adventure on January 27.

Centre supervisor Kirsty Bell was delighted with the strong turnout – and thrill factor.

"They were excited to find each marker, and were fantastic at reading the numbers on each of them," she said.

The program has been developed specifically to challenge and extend play centre for its 3 to 6 year olds.

"We expect to see children grow in their independence through the sessions and develop into competent, confident children, capable of taking on the wide world around them with the necessary skills," she said.

One parent, Jess Mackay said neither she nor her husband were seriously adventurous.

"So this is great. It's exposing the girls to things we would never do ourselves".

Another mum, Sam Munn enjoyed how the children plunged into their new experience.

"I really liked seeing them working as a team to find the markers. I'm calling our first Wild Wednesday a total success".

For Rhia Munn, 3, her favourite thing was "finding the little orange and white squares cut in half".
